Kieleley grew up outside of Syracuse, NY. She studied Social Anthropology at Harvard College where she captained the Harvard Club Lacrosse Team, directed a sexual assault crisis hotline, and led a tutoring program for teens in Mission Hill. During a gap year prior to medical school at Mount Sinai, she co-founded and ran a private tutoring service focused on high school girls headed for STEM or medicine careers. During medical school, she provided nutrition counseling for patients with chronic disease at a free-clinic in Harlem, served as co-President of Medical Students for Haiti, a student-run initiative to increase emergency first responder capacity in Haiti, and worked in a lab developing novel therapies for metastatic prostate cancer. As a categorical resident in the BCRP, Kieleley has continued to demonstrate a commitment to service. She established a partnership between Boston Medical Center and a local meal delivery service; this partnership provides free, medically tailored meals to patients and families and is aimed at reducing pediatric food insecurity, obesity, and malnutrition. She has also stood out for her exceptional commitment to the BCRP community and wellness, from spreading holiday cheer through residency emails and snacks, hosting a multitude of Funuary events, organizing T-shirts for Olympics, and hosting a match day celebration. Next year, Kieleley will be a fellow in GI at Boston Children's Hospital with a focus on nutrition equity and implementation of nutritional based-interventions for disease prevention and treatment.
